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Guidelines. It is the third in the series of biomedical-research ethical guidelines issued by CIOMS since 1982.

International Ethical Guidelines for Health ... - CIOMS

The CIOMS Executive Committee in its 2011 meeting decided to set up a Working Group to revise the International Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research involving Human Subjects. The Working Group consisted of 10 members, one chair (president of CIOMS), four advisers (from WHO, UNESCO, COHRED and WMA) and one scientific secretary.

It was thus that CIOMS set out, in cooperation with WHO, to prepare guidelines " to indicate how the ethical principles that should guide the conduct of biomedical research involving human subjects, as set forth in the Declaration of Helsinki, could be effectively applied, particularly in developing countries, given their socioeconomic circumstances, laws and regulations, and executive and administrative arrangements".

In 1991, CIOMS issued the International Guidelines for Ethical Review of Epidemiological Studies. Another very important milestone is the International Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research Involving Human Subjects (developed in conjunction with WHO), which superseded Proposed Ethical Guidelines (1982) and were published in 1993.

The Guidelines take the position that research involving human subjects must not violate any universally applicable ethical standards, but acknowledge that, in superficial aspects, the

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application of the ethical principles, e.g., in relation to individual autonomy and informed consent, needs to take account of cultural values, while respecting absolutely the ethical standards.

In recent months, updates have been proposed to two important documents in human subjects research oversight: the Federal Policy for the Protection of Human Subjects or 'Common Rule' 1 and the Council for International Organizations of Medical Sciences (CIOMS) Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research 2 (hereafter, 'CIOMS Guidelines').

Recently proposed changes to legal and ethical guidelines ...

The CIOMS guidelines have been developed and revised with the problems of conducting medical research in less developed countries particularly in mind. The proposed guidelines were first published in 1982, revised in 1993, and have now Last month the Bulletin published just one guideline and accompanying commentary.

International ethical guidelines for biomedical research

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The CIOMS guidelines set in an appropriate context the challenges of present-day clinical research, by addressing complex issues including HIV/AIDS research, availability of study treatments after a study ends, women as research subjects, safeguarding confidentiality, compensation for adverse events, as well guidelines on consent.

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However, from 1993 onwards, the Declaration was not alone as a universal guide since CIOMS and the World Health Organization (WHO) had also developed their International Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research Involving Human Subjects. Every researcher intending to use human participants in their research must ensure that the study complies with certain regulations that protect the human subjects which help reduce the risks that medical research bears. These regulations are known as Good Clinical Practice (GCP), learn how to comply with them.

What it means to comply with GCP guidelines in clinical

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Manuscripts describing studies that use death as an endpoint will be subject to additional ethical considerations. Authors are encouraged to follow the Animal Research: Reporting In Vivo Experiments guidelines and recommendations of the Weatherall report (2006) for all studies on non-human primates.

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
